

### NOTICE TO SUBSCRIBERS AND READERS

The offset pages which follow this announcement represent a new indexing system, introduced with this volume (122). A similar index will appear in the last number of each subsequent volume. The format is consistent with that of the Cumulative Index for volumes 71 to 121 which is now in preparation.

The method used (ACC) involves accession, classification and coordination of published material, in a manner similar to the Uniterm system described by Mortimer Taube and Associates (*Studies in Coordinate Indexing*, Vol. 1-3, 1953-56. Documentation Inc., Washington, D.C.).

The index consists of three interdependent parts: Register of Articles, Subject Index, Author Index. When the four numbers of a volume are bound, the Register of Articles would logically be placed at the beginning of the volume, as has been true in the past with the Table of Contents, while the sections dealing with Subject and Author will appear at the end.

#### 1. REGISTER OF ARTICLES.

Full titles, followed by the names of the authors and the number of the first page of each article, constitute this section. Volume number, issue number and date are clearly designated. The arrangement is chronological, each article being entered as a separate document and assigned an accession number. The accession numbers are placed on the left. They are in serial order, and in this regard they follow those accession numbers which will appear in the Cumulative Index. They will continue in consecutive order in subsequent volumes. In the actual text of the volume, the accession number for each article appears directly above the title in bold-face type. The accession numbers serve the important purpose of unifying the three parts of the index.

#### 2. SUBJECT INDEX.

Classification is alphabetical and is limited to two levels of breakdown: main headings and subheadings. Both are derived from a) fragmentation of the title, b) analysis of key material contained in the substance of the articles. The number appearing to the right of each index term corresponds to the accession number appearing at the left of the appropriate title in the register.

Multiplicity of filing terms is accomplished by the use of units of expression, each unit describing a single concept. The association between unit terms is a logical one so that their combination will have the same meaning regardless of the order.

"Coordinate search" under each heading, by comparison of numerals vertically, reveals the essential relationships.

Comparison of the ideas listed under one heading with associated ideas listed under alternative headings enables the reader to discover not only the subjects encompassed by each article, but also to identify other articles dealing with the same subjects.

### 3. AUTHOR INDEX.

All authors are listed alphabetically according to the first letter of the surname. As in the Subject Index the number appearing to the right of each item corresponds to the accession number appearing to the left of the appropriate title in the register.

Please note: The abstracts of the Abel Centennial Meeting of the Society in Baltimore (September, 1957) were published in the first (January) number of this volume (122). These abstracts are indexed by authors only. Thus, those accession numbers in the author index which are accompanied by the suffix "a" refer to abstracts rather than to complete articles. In tracing these it is to be noted that the register contains only one entry (the first - 7701) to cover the abstracts. This entry also lists the range of abstract accession numbers (7702 - 7954). In the actual text, the specific accession number for each abstract appears in parentheses at its conclusion.

The possibility has been considered that additional copies of the indexes for this and future volumes, bound separately, might be of value to libraries and to other subscribers and readers for use in reference work. Such a separate distribution would be justified only if the sale of a significant number of copies could be assured. It is suggested that anyone interested in such separate additional indexes write a letter to the Publisher who can then determine the feasibility of separate distribution.

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
